To the Office of the Chief Information Officer of the State of Iowa,

I am writing this letter to you on behalf of the Clayton County Board of Supervisors. As the Chairperson for the Clayton County Board of Supervisors, I would like to extend our support for the Intent to Quality for Broadband Intervention Zones for the areas of 1. Frenchtown area; 2. Clayton/Fayette; 3. Southeastern Clayton. Clayton County, Iowa has a population of 17,043 people and is a unique rural county located in the Northeast corner of Iowa. The meandering trout streams, rugged sandstone bluffs, and springs appeal to the nature lover in all of us. The county is a place to enjoy plentiful wildlife and scenic rivers with sandy islands, panoramic valleys, historic towns, and timbered hills. This unique landscape and amenities come with higher build out costs and concerns due to the topography and endangered species and rivers. Currently, the Iowa Broadband Map v.5 is comprised of areas where speeds of our only provider do not meet the requirements of 100/20 connectivity and several residents are unserved. We feel there are many more unserved residents that are not included within the map currently as well as many more underserved.

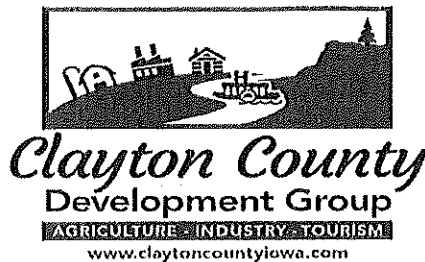
Within our County, we see the struggle and limitations that exist due to the lack of reliable communication services. Local businesses, library patrons, residents, rural residents, students, and emergency services continue to see the limitations to conduct business and participate in remote learning opportunities, meetings, and trainings. Additionally, these areas are considered to be in poor cellular reception areas. As a result, many residents have been recommended to use wi-fi calling to have adequate cell service, increasing the necessity to upgrade speeds and service to improve reliable communication connectivity. For the economic stability of our county, with workforce, education, and health, Clayton County sees the impact that fiber can bring to our school-aged residents, workforce, and businesses.

Clayton County supports the establishment of a Broadband Intervention Zone in and around the areas of Frenchtown, Southeastern Clayton, and Clayton/Fayette, in Clayton. We thank you for your consideration of the ITQ applications. It is our hope that review by the Office of the Chief Information Officer will designate the proposed area as a geographic area of concern/intervention zone for consideration in the next broadband grant program.

With this landscape and amenities as such it comes with higher building costs and concerns to the topography and endangered species and rivers. At this time, the Iowa Broadband Map v.5 is comprised of areas, where speeds of our only provider do not meet the requirements of 100/20 connectivity and several residents are totally unserved.

Clayton County struggles with the limitations that exist due to the lack reliable communication services. Local businesses, library patrons, rural residents, students, and emergency services continue to see the limitations to conduct business and participate in online education, telehealth, meetings, and trainings.

The county is in a poor cellular reception area with many residents are unable to access cellular service at all. As a result, residents have been recommended to use wi-fi calling to have adequate cell service, this increases the necessity to upgrade speeds and broadband service to improve reliable communication connectivity that currently cannot meet those needs.

For the economic stability of Clayton County, for workforce, education, and health, Clayton County sees the impact that fiber can bring to our school-aged residents, workforce, and businesses.

The Clayton County Development Group supports the establishment of a Broadband Intervention Zone in and around the areas in Clayton County. We thank you for your time and consideration of the ITQ proposal to assist rural areas with broadband.

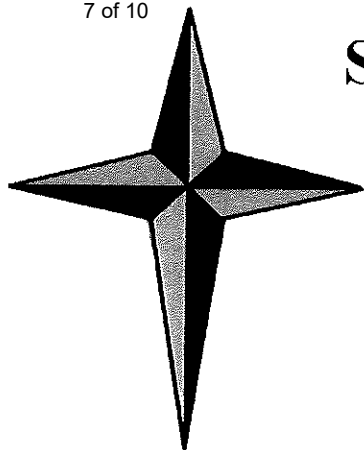

My districts support 600 and 325 students PreK-12 respectively in Fayette, Delaware, Clayton and Buchanan Counties. They support another 200 educators and people who support education as well. We also encompass large number of communities. In our current global educational environment, our students need access to high quality, high speed internet. Our students, staff and community need access to the internet for all manner of activities. To Whom it May Concern:

Please accept this letter on behalf of Guttenberg Municipal Hospital & Clinics (GMHC), expressing support for Allamakee-Clayton Electric Cooperative's desire to expand its fiber network services to Southeastern Clayton, Clayton / Fayette Counties and Frenchtown.

It has been brought to our attention that the three ITQ areas including various communities and rural areas are unserved and under-served. Within the proposed intervention zone, the area is seeing higher levels of poverty. Of note, Clayton County's rate is 12.2%. It is also seeing high levels of children in poverty at 16.3% with 30% of the population being children or young adults under the age of 19. To attract businesses, these people could obtain skills to assist the much-needed workforce. This could benefit both existing and future business growth. To attract families, fiber is needed for residents to work and live where they wish. Fiber will be the key for economic growth, educational improvement, increasing incomes, and improving health. Brain health has become a major concern in Clayton County as well as the State of Iowa. Suicide is on the rise which makes access to tele-health so critical for access so we can reach, assist and help more people. Broadband is the answer to better brain health and wellbeing.

The fiber builds within the county will save our rural areas from depressed economic times, reduction in populations, closures of businesses, closures of school districts, and declining health issues. Clayton County and the southeastern area is like no other area in topography in the state. We need to preserve the landscape and wildlife but cannot sustain our communities on existing businesses and tourism alone.

Internet connectivity has increased dramatically and become even more important in many households since COVID-19 as people continue to work remotely from home; some schools are also utilizing remote learning when there is no school due to bad weather.


With technological advancements, students are also requiring more resources for school work which may not be available due to their internet connection where they live.
