This sub-factor takes into consideration whether Broadband investments in the proposed Geographic Area of Concern will help to facilitate community members engagement in employment, search for employment, and/or develop the requisite skills and knowledge to become employed (e.g., participate in career counseling programs, workforce training programs, as well as gain access to internet websites to search for and apply to jobs).

Work:

To expand the workforce in rural Iowa, many businesses had offered remote work from home type opportunities to prospective employees. This has opened up the ability for residents in Nashua, Iowa and Chickasaw County to obtain higher paying jobs in their field of expertise. However, without reliable internet access, such work arrangements are not feasible. Communities that have broadband support have better economic relationships with employers and in turn, a better all-around community culture for citizens.

This subfactor takes into consideration whether Broadband investments in the proposed Geographic Area of Concern will help facilitate educational activities. Such education activities may be to acquire knowledge and/or skills, undertaken as part of a person's participation in school, an academic program, extracurricular program, social-emotional development program for students or youths, internship, or professional development program, or in another educational environment.

Education:

The shutdown of schools in 2020 was a true test of resiliency in the educational system. Nashua-Plainfield Schools were able to pivot quickly into a virtual learning environment by offering 1:1 devices to students. However, it was discovered that a significant number of families did not have internet access and mobile internet hotspots were deployed to those families. By having broadband access in the community, this would make future disruptions to the school system less noticeable and give the ability to switch over into a virtual classroom with minimal impact.

Nashua is located 40 minutes Southeast of North Iowa Area Community College, and 45 minutes Northwest of Hawkeye Community College. Many college and continuing education classes are being offered in a hybrid manner, requiring in person and online sessions. This gives residents the opportunity to access either of the community colleges, however reliable broadband will enhance the experience for such learners by allowing them to have access to content.

This subfactor takes into consideration whether Broadband investments in the proposed Geographic Area of Concern will help facilitate health monitoring services to monitor an individual's health, including with respect to either physical or behavioral health.

Health Monitoring:

Nashua is fortunate to have a partnership with Waverly Health Center by offering a small clinic to the 1,551 residents in town. The clinic is able to offer a variety of services but patients in need of specialists are required to go to Mason City or Waterloo. Tele-health services are offered on a limited basis but have the potential to expand with broadband access to the town.
